But as we struggle to adapt to new norms and attempt to envision an uncertain future, we have been grateful for our foundational systems. In particular, the Thrive Network of coaches was able to quickly mobilize and adapt to address the pressing issues of sweeping unemployment for already vulnerable citizens; Indiana United Ways worked with Lilly Endowment to facilitate significant and immediate funds to support non-profit services that ensure food, shelter and safety across the state. RSVP's Are You Ok? program became a lifeline for vulnerable seniors and other homebound residents.

2020 has become a test of the systems and supports we work so hard to build and sustain. It's too soon for a final grade, but my mid-term assessment highlights:

- Many Thrive Network coaches and other frontline nonprofit staff were trained as Certified Community Health Workers through a grant from Prosperity Indiana, helping them more fully assess all the needs of struggling individuals, and creating a working network between health, government and social service organizations across our county.
- •Our years of foundational work and development of the COAD Community Organizations Active in Disaster paid off when a tornado hit southern Madison County, particularly the town of Pendleton. We have now tapped this group to help us develop a stronger shelter plan for situations such as COVID-19 that create new and longer-term challenges.
- •Through the generosity of Thompson Insurance and the support of Madison County Federal Credit Union, we launched a car loan program for Thrive clients.
- Elementary schools and On My Way Pre-K providers are receiving a total of 2,676 books through a grant from First Book. These new, high quality books are provided to the children they serve to expand early literacy and are especially helpful as children spend more time learning from home.



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As part of the state digital services team, we have created easy messaging and two-way
engagement tools to streamline communications and hear from our community, including
engaging people in advocacy with the IUW-sponsored CQ Engage tool (iuw.org).

- •We initiated our first Virtual Campaign successfully in 2019, a decision that proved fortuitous for 2020.
- •We began to engage our community in crucial conversations around race, equity and inclusion and this year adopted the United Way Worldwide Diversity and Inclusion Statement of Principle, with the expressed understanding that this action is only the beginning of our work to challenge and change all of our processes to ensure that we live out our mission to fight for the health, education and financial stability of every person in every community.
- A new ALICE Report (Asset-Limited-Income-Constrained-Employed) highlights the systemic long-term challenges of low income households prior to COVID-19.

Factors that will impact our final grade:

- A looming housing crisis as ALICE households face long term employment reductions combined with an existing lack of affordable options.
- The ability of child care providers to withstand decreased enrollments until
 parents return to work will affect the ability of those parents to reengage in
 the job market.
- The digital divide becomes an even bigger barrier to services with restricted travel and in-person access to essential services and education.
- •Unmet needs for mental health treatment, already a significant underlying barrier to stability, are growing as the economic and health crisis lingers.
- Loss of business revenue and employment impacts households, but also the ability of nonprofit organizations to continue to assist those in need.
- Our ability to support the common good despite the divisive rhetoric and other forces that seek to create chaos and conflict.

All of us at United Way will miss her dearly.


Caring is essential

What is essential?

The dictionary definition does little to answer the question. Es-sen-tial. Of the utmost importance: basic, indispensable, necessary. As the COVID-19 pandemic swept our country this year, the question became a debate: essential jobs, essential services, essential travel, essential lives.

In the midst of this pandemic, the Indiana United
Ways released an updated ALICE Report – the
biennial snapshot of the challenges facing the roughly
40 percent of households that, even before the pandemic,
struggled to afford the essentials – food, safe shelter, healthcare,
child care, transportation. The COVID-19 pandemic increased the
number of households in crisis nearly overnight and challenged the ability of
United Way and our partners to respond in unprecedented ways.

The United Way Board quickly approved immediate use of discretionary funds for the



most pressing needs – food and shelter. We also quickly activated a way for everyone who could to join us by launching the COVID-19 Response Fund. Thank you to those who have and continue to support this effort.

Through the strength of the United Way network, Indiana United Ways was able to leverage the longstanding partnership with Lilly Endowment to bring significant funding into our communities through the Economic Relief Initiative (ERI). The goals of this funding are to address immediate needs for households impacted by COVID-19 and to support the nonprofit system that is so essential to providing that assistance.

This generous grant - \$800,000 - is a lifeline that we are working to use to maximum effect.

Because many partner organizations – often dependent on volunteers that were sheltering in place and without resources to adapt - closed, UWMC rallied the network of Thrive coaches virtually and gave them a new charge: help people in crisis develop a plan for sheltering, access all resources, and if needed, tap a newly-created crisis fund to bridge the gaps.

The Thrive Network has proven to be nimble and responsive to challenges as they arise. The coaches, supported by United Way Vice President of Impact Karen Hemberger, case management consultant Cherilyn Horning and training consultant Annie Wood-Bell, have met this crisis with grace and admirable fortitude. Thank you, Julie Barton, Langa Floyd, Penny Henderson, Judy Johnson, Brandon Lien, Amy Newton, Suzanne Pasztor and Jackie Washington!

A basic need is shelter. Part of the ERI funds will be directed toward developing options that our community lacks today: drop-in homeless shelter, short term emergency shelter that can accommodate social distancing and other safety protocols, family shelter. UWMC's existing partnership in disaster response is our foundation for this work.

Now that it's clear this crisis will be with us for at least many more months, we will begin to think about child care and long-term health implications, leveraging our statewide network and relationships with Indiana 211, now operated by FSSA, and Covering Kids & Families. We are also rethinking volunteerism, adapting processes for food distribution, weatherization and early literacy, and continuing to promote the RSVP Are You Ok?/

Senior Link program that is a physical and mental health lifeline for many.

While this pandemic has caused all of us to ask, "What are my essential needs?" our invitation is to ask, "What is my essential response?" We believe our essential response is to care - however and whenever possible. The CARES Act has added an incentive for donating by making a \$300 above-the-line deduction available for taxpayers that don't itemize on 2020 tax returns. Those that do itemize can deduct as much as 100 percent of their adjusted gross income for 2020 tax year.

For decades, the ability of both government and nonprofits to provide a safety net of basic services has eroded. Even as charitable giving has increased, giving to this sector has gone down. While the reasons are debated, those debates fade in the face of suffering and death in communities across our country.

But United Way was made for this. United, we have always faced our challenges. United we live; United we Thrive, and United We Rise.



"People don't realize that life can change in a moment."

Words filled with more truth than many of us want to believe, spoken by a THRIVE client as she shared her story.

She had struggled with addiction and mental illness in the past. Her determination to overcome had led to years of sobriety with a therapist that was helping her. She was on the right path, but a moment was about to happen that would change everything, for the worse.

In May of 2019, she was two months behind on her bills but still making payments. However, she was not able to afford food. On May 3, she fell and severely broke her foot. As a result, she was unable to walk, out of work for 6 months, had no income plus no working vehicle because it was in need of repair and she didn't have the funds to fix it. Without being able to work, she wasn't able to pay rent, utilities or anything else. She didn't know what to do so she reached out to the THRIVE Network.

"I was willing to do whatever it took. I didn't work that hard in recovery to watch it all fall out from under me," she said. "The THRIVE staff is amazing.

They gave me grace and hope when I had none. Through all parts of the program they were able to help me rebuild my life. THRIVE offers you support and resources to get off a bad path and onto a better one."

Working with multiple THRIVE coaches, she was able to find financial assistance for rent and utilities after her fall. She also worked with an employment coach to build a new resume and find a new job that she feels called to. Her continued work with THRIVE's financial coach is putting her finances on track. "It gave me my life back in all aspects - income, job, home and support. Through all of that I regained the things in life that I had lost."

The moment she fell changed everything. She is still learning how to walk, eat, sleep and manage everything in her life again. She credits both the THRIVE Network and her church with providing her support during this journey and she encourages others to not give up on themselves. "There are people out there that care, if you don't think that, there is. You just have to make the first step."

For 40 years Kelly Chambers had a medical practice focused primarily on older people. Over that time, his patients became friends, and as both patients and physician aged, he became aware of issues outside the scope of traditional medical training that were more important than blood sugar, ideal body weight and blood pressure. Problems like fear, sadness, loss.

"Loneliness was a terrible problem," he recalled. "When people came in for visits, we would talk for a long time - which used to drive the office manager crazy - but we both needed that contact between two human beings." That's why in the fall of 2015 he took note of Senior Link-Are You OK?, a volunteer opportunity of RSVP 55+ volunteer program, a service of United Way of Madison County. The program, a collaboration with the Anderson Police and Madison County Sheriff's departments, provides check in, telephone reassurance and friendly phone calls to older or disabled homebound individuals.

Recently retired, Kelly was more than willing to lend his time and expertise to advise the staff on outreach and communications, assist with training, and recruit both volunteers and recipients for the service. He knew that families often urged his older patients to move to a facility to be safe, but patients wanted to remain at home. "So you have this balancing act between happy and safe," he said. "This program seemed to be the perfect balance. It allows the person to be home, but also offers some safety."

Another advantage of the program is that the volunteers are older too. "From my standpoint, the more time I have to think about myself, the worse off I am," he said. Focusing on others is a great remedy. "That's the beauty of this. You can see that the volunteers really care about the people they're dealing with. There is a bond. I see a lot of lasting, probably everlasting, friendships develop."

Noting that the aging population is the fastest growing segment of our country, Kelly thinks that the ability to stay independent and to make lasting friendships is a win-win. He also thinks the volunteer aspect enhances its value for those being served because "it's special when someone reaches out and touches you for no other reason than that they want to do it."

Following a career that built a depth of understanding for the human condition, Kelly sums it up pretty simply: "We're meant to help other people. I think that's why we're here."
